

WITH NANCY WHIPPLE GRINNELL

Did you ever wonder about the curious drawings by artist Marian Dunlop (1911-2000) that have hung in the corridors of the Art Club over the years? They have titles referencing "Miss Blackshear" and figures that are geometric and futuristic, yet drawn with

Renaissance proportion and perspective. After some research, it turns out that Dunlop studied at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago with Kathleen Blackshear,



a legendary artist and teacher "whose bold, simplified forms and rhythmic or patterned elements often featured strong diagonals and tilted planes." Blackshear's modernism, which included an interest in cubism and African masks, is reflected in Dunlop's drawings (or assignments), likely done in the 1940s.

From an affluent family with a home and studio on Blackstone Boulevard, Marian Dunlop attended the Wheeler School, RISD and then studied in Florence, Italy. Forsaking a life in the social whirl, in the 1930s Dunlop traveled the world, from the Far East to South Africa and South America with her mother and sister and seven cameras. An accomplished photographer, Dunlop's travel pictures were featured in the Providence Journal and her 4,000 feet of motion pictures were shown locally.

Always most interested in set design and moving pictures, Dunlop worked on a Hollywood film and for the Shakespeare Theater in England; she made masks for an Italian production of "A Midsummer Night's Dream. A lifetime member of the Providence Art Club, Dunlop often exhibited her drawings and watercolors. She served on many Providence boards and was the first woman president of the Providence Chapter of the American Red Cross.

Rebecca Riley worked for nearly twenty years as Program Director and Vice President at the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation in Chicago.

During her tenure she helped the foundation implement multimillion dollar grant making initiatives focused on community



development, urban policy and regional planning, and advancing the arts and cultural institutions. Since retiring from MacArthur in 2000, she has been an active trustee on many nonprofit boards including WBEZ (Chicago's NPR affiliate), the Regional Plan Association in New York and the Rails-to-Trails Conservancy in Washington, D.C. From 2011-2014, Riley joined her husband, who was US Ambassador to ASEAN, in Jakarta, Indonesia from where they traveled extensively and worked throughout the ten Southeast Asian member countries. Before that, she served four years in Liberia as a US Peace Corps volunteer.

JUDY VILMAIN TEACHING THE ARTS

Maya Stern, PAC's Education Coordinator, sat down with one of our most known members, Judy Vilmain on Teaching the Arts. When asked what interested her in teaching, Judy stated; "I've always loved teaching — I was a psychology professor at Kent State University, and I was missing that interaction. I love sharing my enthusiasm about still life painting. Plus, I enjoy bossing people around." Judy shared that the biggest lessons she's learned as an arts instructor is the importance of critiquing each of one's paintings. I ask myself, "What's good about this painting? What's wrong with it? What else is wrong with it?" Consistently critiquing your work really speeds up improvement. Maya asked Judy who or what has been a resource, influence, or inspiration towards her teaching, and Judy replied' "I love scouring Pinterest and Instagram looking for good and bad examples of each exercise l assign. It's an easy way of educating oneself. Judy's favorite exercise to work on with students is to place a glass vase half-filled with water on a white tabletop in front of a dark background, and see how few marks you can make to depict the vase. How little information can you provide the viewer and still have them perceive it as a glass vase? Really challenge yourself to hold back on details.



Employee Spotlight MICHAEL ROSE

Michael Rose has been the Art Club's Gallery Manager since 2014. Originally from Southeastern Massachusetts, Michael is the child of two chemists and has three sisters. Interested in art from a young age, he took his first art classes as a kid at the Fall River Art Association and majored in art history at Providence College, where he was active in the Art Department and was Managing Editor of the school newspaper, The Cowl. After graduating from PC in 2013, Michael briefly worked in the public relations and development field before joining the staff of PAC. Asked what has been most special about his time at the Art Club, Michael says, "Getting to know and work with so many different artists

has been a lot of fun. Every day at PAC is different and there are always new opportunities to learn." While at PAC, Michael has also been involved in the local art community, jurying exhibitions, and teaching classes. In 2017 he completed his Certificate in Appraisal Studies in Fine and Decorative Art at New York University. Outside of PAC, Michael also writes about art and artists. His reviews have been published in Big Red & Shiny, Art New England, and since 2021 he has authored the popular weekly "Inside Art" column on the visual arts across Rhode Island for GoLocalProv.com. When not at work you can find him spending time with his nephews Theo and Cal, making his own art, attending Friar Basketball games, or grabbing a drink at one of Providence's many fine cocktail bars.
